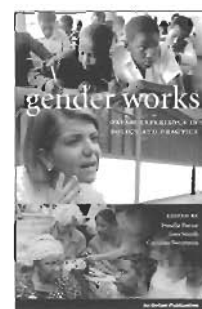

Gender analysis has been used in international development for many years. It is now widely recognised that a better understanding of the particular and differentiated needs of women and men makes a significant difference in the fight against poverty and disadvantage. This practical guide is designed to help those working in local government or the voluntary sector to plan and deliver services which will have a real impact on the everyday lives of women and men.

See Both Sides provides advice on strategy, training exercises, and impact-assessment tools. It shares examples from the experience of an organisation providing services to lone parents which successfully used gender analysis to widen its target group, revitalise existing services, and develop new ones. The process enabled the staff to identify lone parents, recognise that welfare services do not always reach them, and change their work to reflect the reality of the ways in which parents share care.

There is much common ground between gender and other aspects of social equality. *See Both Sides* can also be used to support work on race, disability, and other related topics.

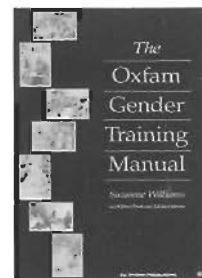

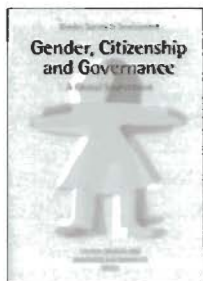
