The framework of the WFC (Future Justice Framework)

<u>Question</u>: How can we measure, whether the introduced policies had the desired effect?

<u>Tools</u>: (a) Future Justice Indicators, (b) Future Justice Barometer, (c) Ombudsman for Future Generations

Question: How can we most efficiently disseminate the "best policy"?

<u>Tools</u>: Three phase model of political advocacy



<u>Question</u>: How can we efficiently identify the policies that have a high impact and a high likelihood to count as "best policies" from the millions of policies governing life on earth? <u>Tools</u>: AGM, Councillor input, individual research, advisors

<u>Question</u>: Is the identified policy a "best policy"? <u>Tools</u>: Application Tool Kit

Dissemination of best policies (campaigning) is a well understood process ...

Step 1

Awareness Raising: making politicians/ policy makers and the public aware of the existence of best policies. Educating politicians/ policy makers and the public about their positive effects and their future justness

Step 2

Political Engagement/ Advocacy: educating, consulting/ engaging with the legislation and politicians about the necessity to introduce "best policies". Promoting the introduction of these policies

Step 3

Political Empowerment/ Enabling Legislation: developing tools to empower legislation. Allowing politicians to introduce the "best policies" in question quickly and efficiently ... that builds on a solid tool kit

The Challenges

The WFC Work Programme

- Climate crisis rising average temperatures are predicted to lead to severe ecological, humanitarian, and economic crises
 - Resource crisis humanity is currently destroying the foundations for life: water, arable land, clean air and many other goods that we take for granted are becoming scarce
- Economic crisis the existing global economic system is neither equitable nor sustainable
- Social crisis a wrong understanding of wellbeing and justice coupled with a wrong scientific framework have resulted in a highly unequal world
- Armed conflicts a huge stock pile of arms, a new nuclear arms race among developing countries and a proliferation of local and regional armed conflicts have hampered the attempt to build a world at peace

Future Justice Framework

'Best policies' Evaluation

Finalize the application tool kit to evaluate "best policies" and develop a training programme

Measuring/Controlling

- Develop a set of indicators to measure the effect of "best policies"
- Develop a Future Justice Barometer to measure the effect of concrete policy decisions
- Develop a model legislation for the representation of future generations (Ombudsman) for controlling policy making

Bad policy approach

Define a mechanism to prevent and outlaw bad policy authorization

- Accelerate the dissemination of FIT policies in various regions (USA, Africa)
- Build competence in renewable energies for non-grid regions (focus Africa)

Energy Sufficiency

 Promote the smart use of energy (US, Europe, China)

Carbon-absorbing measures

- Disseminate the concept of a Renewable Energy Policy Fund
- Create an alliance for carbon sequestration

Sustainable Cities

 Establish WFC as policy reference for city related policies

Sustainable Economies

Future Finance

- Promotion of legislation that supports small and medium size banks and that break the dominance of finance over the real economy
- Increase the stability and sustainability of the financial markets through promotion of policies that support lending to sustainable projects in the real economy
- Support policies that improve the level of resilience of small and medium sized companies against massive external economic shocks (focus on business to business currencies)

Just Societies

Trustworthy Institutions

- Future Justice Education. Promote the application of the future justice framework in policy making in EU, OECD, and UN
- Apply Future Justice Indicators in the context of MDG+15
- Representation of Future Generations. Promote intuitional representation on all governmental levels
- Generate significant government support for the official recognition of Crimes against Future Generations ("bad policies")
