

CULTURELINK is the worldwide Network of Networks for Research and Cooperation in Cultural Development.

This Network embraces research, information and documentation networks, and institutions devoted to cultural development and international cooperation.

It was established in 1989 following the Recommendation adopted at the *International Consultation of Representatives of Regional and Subregional Networks for Cultural Development, Research and Cooperation,* organised by UNESCO and the Council of Europe, in Paris, June 1989.

CULTURELINK was co-founded by UNESCO and the Council of Europe. The Institute for International Relations, Zagreb, Croatia has been the focal point of the Network since its foundation.

The Network gathers over 1500 networks, institutions, organizations, foundations and professionals from over 100 countries in all parts of the world, which are engaged and interested in cultural development, cultural policies and cooperation, cultural management and education.
